The highlight of this celebration luncheon was the special honor and recognition accorded Julie Bondarenko, our immediate past president who served in that role for 5½ years during

the prize which will afford the “winner” the chance to enjoy a spectacular view and delectable food.

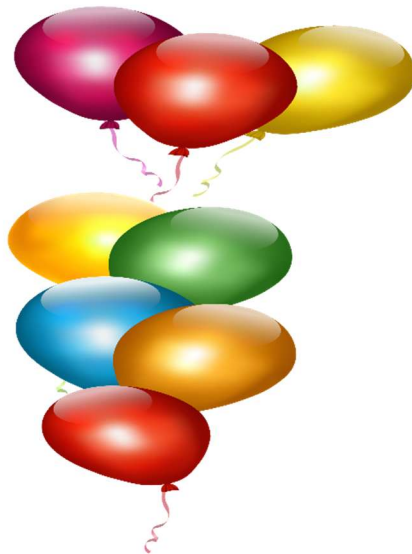

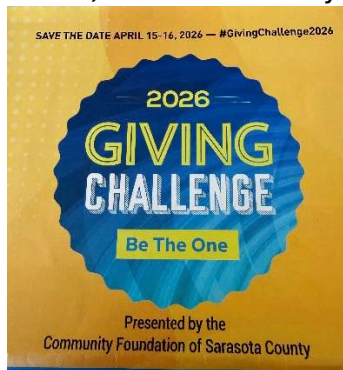

THE GIVING CHALLENGE: APRIL 15-16, 2026

PART II

INTRODUCTION: Part I of this article appeared in the March 2026 newsletter. I explained our status as a “Giving Partner” within the Community Foundation of Sarasota County (CFSC). I then discussed the purposes of the “Giving Challenge” and the upcoming online giving day from noon to noon on Wed/Thurs, April 15-16, 2026 (24-hour event). Part II reviews (1) GCICS’s success in the last three Giving Challenges; and (2) how the GC works. The article concludes with a challenge to you the members to exceed the \$5,025 donated in 2024.

HOW IT WORKS: I will provide instructions in an email by April 8 on how to access the CFSC website and proceed through the donation process. Keep in mind that it is an ONLINE giving day

over a 24-hour period. As in the past, the Patterson Foundation, working with the CFSC, offers a 1:1 match from \$25 to \$100 per donor. This means that donors can double their impact. Thus, if I donate \$100 to GCICS's Scholarship/Grants Program (using my credit card), GCICS will obtain \$200. The other key is that the donations must be made in that 24-hour window. All donations are tax deductible.

CLOSING: As I wrote in Part I of this article (March newsletter), it is only through your generosity that we have awarded \$2,000 scholarships to high school seniors of Italian ancestry; and have provided \$1,000 grants to the Sarasota Youth Opera and the Sarasota Ballet's youth group. And it is only through your generosity that we will be able to continue this support for the youth of Sarasota & Manatee counties. *I challenge you, our 150 members, to exceed the \$5,025 that 56 of the 143 members donated in 2024. Thank you for whatever you can and wish to give. All donations are important no matter the amount.*

I was born in Chicago and am half Italian. My dad's parents both emigrated from Sicily and lived in Lincoln Park. As a child, visiting my grandparents was exotic to me—the heavenly smells of Grandma's kitchen, abundant and delicious food, and small rooms crammed with family loudly speaking a mix of Italian and English. I also loved everything about the vibrant, congested neighborhood. By contrast, my mom was from a large farm family in rural AL, which offered a completely different, but equally fascinating experience.

From my early love of “the city” and the beautiful Appalachian region that my mom was from, I studied both geography and urban issues in college. I earned a BA in Environmental Studies from Northeastern IL University and an MA in Urban Planning from the University of IL, Chicago. I met my husband, Jim, in graduate school. At that time, he was taking guitar lessons and had just started performing in public. While he honed his performing and songwriting skills, I became and still am his biggest fan! We

were married in July 1983 on a large ferry boat docked at Navy Pier with the Chicago skyline and lakefront as the backdrop.

I began my career as a city planner with the Chicago Department of Planning. I loved the work, but in 1985, Jim and I escaped Chicago's harsh winters and moved to Austin, TX. We both continued working in the planning field. In 1996, I accepted a position with the US Department of Labor in Washington, DC and we moved to Alexandria, VA. In 2001, I began working with the U.S. Government Accountability Office, a non-partisan Congressional agency. After a long and rewarding career, I retired in early 2016 and we moved to Sarasota later that year.

I've always been so proud of my Italian roots and joined GCICS in May 2023. At our first happy hour, I was reminded of my Italian family in Chicago and felt an immediate connection. I'm delighted to serve on the Board of Directors and look forward to doing all I can to contribute to this organization that we thoroughly enjoy and appreciate.

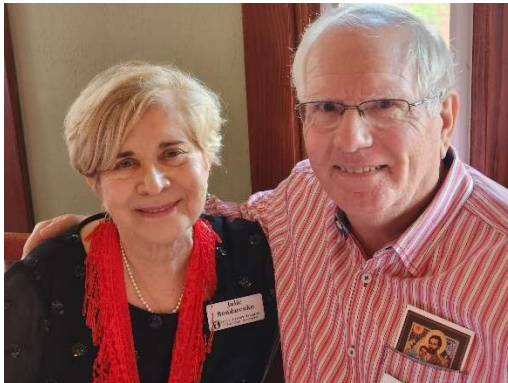

Setting: March 2020--a pandemic is in full swing with the world closing down. Sheryl Lazzarotti has announced her retirement from the GCICS Presidency. Two candidates kindly offer for the position and are asked to share their qualifications and a vision statement. Here is an excerpt from Julie's vision statement: *My vision is to build on the current Board's accomplishments and continue to promote ideas that foster friendships among our entire GCICS community. Creating and nurturing an inviting atmosphere will help to further build a multi-event group so that our Society will function at its best and be celebrated as a desirable cultural and social group.*

Election: Julie was elected in May 2020 and conducted her first Board meeting and the first ever on Zoom on June 3, 2020. For more than a year, she presided over an organization that held all meetings, events, and socials via Zoom. It was an extraordinary time in our lives, but Julie was determined to keep us all safe while keeping us united in the spirit of Italian culture and fellowship, or as she called it FRIENDSHIP. That was how her presidency began, which no one could have anticipated. But we emerged in the fall of 2021 with a fabulous Welcome Back Luncheon in which we re-launched our GCICS Italian American of the Year Program and never looked back.

Accomplishments: I would like to share with you the many accomplishments during Julie's tenure. Yes, it takes a village, and she had Board members willing to give incredible amounts of time and energy. But it was her leadership that made all of these accomplishments happen in the end. During her tenure, **six GCICS members accepted appointments on the**

Board: Gordon Bloom, 2021; Linda Ahern, 2022; Josephine Fontana and Sandra Russell, 2023; Phil Miner, 2024; and Camille Kramer, 2025. During her tenure, **five new GCICS committees were established** and became fully operational: Giving Partner/Giving Challenge under Jerry Hall and later Ellen Roderick's leadership; Technology under Gordon Bloom's leadership; Finance under Josephine Fontana's leadership; Program under Camille Kramer's leadership; and Membership under Phil Miner's leadership. These five well-defined committees lead fundraising initiatives, create and

maintain a user-friendly website, develop wise spending plans and annual budgets, craft new and exciting programs, and create strategies to attract new members. These committees operate in the background even as the full Board operates in the foreground. But without these committees we would not be the organization we have become.

Advancements: I want to cite **six specific advancements** that happened under Julie's leadership: (1) an online payment system that has saved hundreds of hours in the registration process and has stopped thousands of checks from flying through the air and hoping they land in our P.O. Box; (2) a talented and responsive bookkeeper, Kathy Antini, who manages our accounts and completes all required reporting to FL and the IRS; (3) a redesigned website for which we can be most proud; it has been responsible for attracting new members and for representing our organization so beautifully to the general public; (4) expanded programs and activities that now run 12 months of the year; (5) an extensive variety of programs ranging from college professors to our own talented members as presenters, to regularly scheduled HHs open to all members, and LaCena's that with HHs create fellowship and lasting friendships; and (6) a re-activated GCICS Italian American of the Year Program after it lay dormant since 2016; over four years, 2021 to 2024, we conferred the title of GCICS Italian American of the Year on Rev Father Fausto, Pastor Emeritus, St. Martha's Catholic Church; Robert Mei, longtime proprietor of Café Baci; Dr. Davide Tanasi, Professor of History at USF, Tampa; and Leita Kaldi Davis, member, author, and humanitarian.

Working President: All of these changes took place under Julie's leadership. Yes, it takes a village and oftentimes, the leader does not get the credit she or he is due. Julie was always there for us as we proposed innovative ideas, crafted programs, and organized new and exciting activities. She encouraged us, and more importantly, she rolled up her sleeves and was a working President as well. Case in point: The Board had talked for two years about finding a vendor to make our classy shirts. Julie said enough is enough; she found an excellent vendor; she acquired all the specs; we announced the sale; and bingo: we have our classy shirts because Julie was a working President, never reluctant to do what it takes to make something happen for you the members.

President's Messages: I want to close by focusing on one final contribution Julie made during the five years that I believe brought us closer together, especially during the two years of COVID but even beyond that time. That contribution was her monthly President's Messages in our newsletter. She took that task seriously and devoted hours to writing what she felt deep down in her heart. She made the message so relevant to what was often happening in the world such as the war in Ukraine, expressing a deep sense of caring for those suffering in that country. And in her messages, she never failed to extend thanks to those who made significant contributions to the Society in the previous month. It might be a Board member or a member who went the extra mile such as Mike and Patty DiMicele, hosting our fundraisers or Paola Tate teaching our language courses, or Scholarship Committee members for their dedicated work each year.

Closing/Track Record/Toast: Julie, you have quite the "track record" as GCICS's 10th President. Only one other president served longer than your five years, and that was Gabriella Thurston who served for eight years from 1993-2001. Kudos to you. Please lift your glasses to toast dear Julie, followed by a round of applause. Thank you.

Thank you, Ellen, George, Sandy, and Gordon. I am truly honored and genuinely humbled by this recognition and your kind words. It has left me speechless, but I still want to share what the Gulf Coast Italian Culture Society has meant to me.
